The Master Ballot Position is determined by the Lt. Governor's office in accordance with Utah State Code 20A-6-305.

The 2021 Clinton City Municipal General Election will be conducted as Vote by Mail in coordination with the Davis County Clerk/Auditor. For information on Vote by Mail & Voter Registration visit www.DavisVotes.com. For those who wish to vote early, ballots can be dropped off in a secure drop box in the Recreation Department parking lot 1651 W 2300 N prior to the election. Voters can deposit ballots in any official Davis County drop box up until 8:00 pm on Nov 2. If voters put their ballot in the mail, it is recommended that they mail them by the October 29, 2021. It must be postmarked on or before Mon Nov 1 to be counted. For those who wish to vote in person, a polling location will be available at Clinton City Recreation 1651 W 2300 N on Nov 2, 2021 from 7 am to 8pm.

HILL AIR FORCE BASE OFFERS INDOOR AIR SAMPLING

The Air Force has begun its annual outreach to homes and businesses in Clinton near areas of groundwater contamination from HAFB. Those affected will receive a packet in the mail offering free indoor air sampling to determine if potentially harmful vapors from the groundwater could be entering homes or workplaces. Sampling will take place October 2021 through March 2022. If vapors are found above established action levels, steps will be taken to prevent those vapors from entering the home or building. The city drinking water has not been affected by the contamination.

If you do not receive a letter, you are not within an area of concern. Those receiving the mailing are encouraged to request indoor air sampling. Information about the program, including COVID precautions and maps showing the areas eligible for sampling is available at www.hill.af.mil/IAP. 
CLUB 55/SENIOR LUNCHEON

Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety.

Is there a beep or a chirp coming out of your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm? What does it all mean? Knowing the difference can save you, your home, and your family! Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and knows how to respond. Learn the sounds of your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms by checking the user guide or search the brand and model online.

What is your alarm telling you?

SMOKE ALARMS

- A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single “chirp” every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of everyone in your home, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

Some tips:

- ✓ Install a bedside alert device that responds to the sound of the smoke and CO alarms. Use of a low frequency alarm can also wake a sleeping person with mild to severe hearing loss.
- ✓ Sleep with your mobility device, glasses, and phone close to your bed.
- ✓ Keep pathways like hallways lit with night lights and free from clutter to make sure everyone can get out safely.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS

- A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home. Go outside, call 9-1-1 and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
- CO alarms also have “end of life” sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it’s time to get a new CO alarm.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

Hear a Beep, Get On Your Feet!

Get out and stay out! Call 9-1-1 from outside.



Hear a Chirp, Make a Change!

A chirping alarm needs attention. Replace the batteries or the entire unit if it's over 10 years old.

If you don't remember how old the unit is, replace it!
