#### MAYOR'S MINUTE

Thank you all for making Clinton an amazing place to live. It's heartwarming to see all the good that is done amongst neighbors. I have enjoyed serving you this past year. Here is a brief recap of the year by department.

City Hall consists of administration, finance, and elected officials. Together they coordinate a 30 million dollar budget and 130 employees, which balloons to 200 in the summer months. We have worked hard to keep you all informed. Please continue to send in your suggestions and ideas on how we can improve.

Community Development has a new director, building official, and planning technician. I have heard great feedback on how impressive their team is. They have been hard at work with helping many new businesses and subdivisions come to town. Lots of hours have gone into updating code and working on landscape ordinances.

Courts have been operating virtually since Covid. For those unaware, the city has a justice courtroom on the lower level of city hall. We have a part time judge and several employees that make sure laws are followed.

Fire successfully instituted a paramedic unit. They hired six full time and several part time medics and added a paramedic truck. It was an honor to see one of our captains selected to be the fire chief at another department. Our department was able to fill the vacancy from within. One highlight was holding the fire open house again. It was nice to have a huge turn out.

Parks did a wonderful job putting up holiday lights which brightened the civic center. I hope everyone was able to see how beautiful the recreation building and trees looked. Hopefully, we can add to the collection of lights next year and add some around city hall and public safety buildings. Work has started on flipping several city owned park strips. The flower baskets looked beautiful all season long even with half the watering.

Police added two officers and got one back that was deployed with the Army. This brings our total to 23, which is a great step towards the goal of one officer per thousand residents. Sergeant Gill won the small department officer of the year award for the state. Calls for service were over 15,000 vs 12,000 last year. Our department continues to shine even with the large increase in priority and escalated incidents.

Public Works are the heroes that keep your taps running, sewer flushing and roads plowed. Their quick action saved us from having a water boil order. The recently built salt shed has come in handy with all the snow storms. Please remember to keep your water meter clear all year long.

Recreation made a goal to have a community event every quarter. This became a reality with the addition of the Blitzen Bash. It was a magical evening! My favorite was the reindeer with gigantic antlers. Our director has done a wonderful job in her new role. Heritage Days will be in June and there will not be a carnival this year.

This list could go on & On. We are blessed to live in a great city.

#### NOTICE OF 2023 BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWAL

Business licenses for the 2022 business year expired on December 31, 2022. For convenience renewal applications were mailed in November. If you did not receive a renewal application please contact the Clinton Community Development Department at (801) 614-0740. (Business license fees for renewal businesses shall be due on or before Jan 1 of each year and shall be delinquent if not paid prior to February 1 of each year.) All businesses are required to submit a renewal application even if the fee exemption qualification is met. \*\*If you are no longer operating a business please contact our office, so we can remove your information from our active files.

**ROUND-A-BOUT INFO** Round-a-bouts in Clinton City provide safer and more efficient traffic flow than standard intersections. They keep traffic moving one-way in a counterclockwise direction, providing for fewer conflict points which allows traffic to flow more smoothly.

Follow these steps for driving in the round-a-bouts:

- Slow down and obey traffic signs;
- Yield to pedestrians and bicyclists;
- **Yield to traffic already in the round-a-bout;**
- Enter the round-a-bout when there is a safe gap in traffic;
- Keep your speed low within the round-a-bout;
- As you approach your exit, turn on your right turn signal.

**WINTER PARKING RESTRICTIONS** remain in effect from November 15 thru March 15 regardless of the weather. There is no on street parking allowed from 12 AM to 7 AM.

Please keep in mind that during a snow storm, higher traveled streets (collector roads) will normally be plowed first, with special attention to hills and difficult intersections.

Please do not shovel snow from your driveway into the street.

Winter driving can be unpredictable. Please pay attention to road conditions, be patient and drive safely. Thank you!!

**PLEASE CONSIDER WHAT YOU PUT DOWN YOUR SINKS AND TOILETS**

**PAPER TOWELS, BABY WIPES, CLEANING WIPES, COOKING GREASE, DIAPERS, SANITARY NAPKINS, DENTAL FLOSS AND ANY OTHER PAPER, PLASTIC OR CLOTH MATERIALS CONTRIBUTE TO SEWER BLOCKAGES AND PUMP FAILURES IN THE SEWER COLLECTION SYSTEM.**

City crews are struggling to keep pipes in our system clear of disposable wipes and scrubbers like those advertised on TV. Contrary to advertisements, these items are **not** sewer system friendly and, significantly increase the likelihood of a sanitary sewer backup in your basement and/or your neighbors'. Sewer backups caused by these products can occur rapidly. The city will not be responsible for the backup or any related damages. Please do not dispose of paper or plastic products (beyond toilet tissue) in your toilet or other drains. The home you save may be your own. Thank you.

Effective January 1, 2023, Clinton City will implement tiered billing for culinary water use.

The new rates will be based on the number of gallons used per household. In the past, everyone paid the same rate per month. Rates will now adjust every 2,000 gallons. After 10,000 gallons used, the tiers will adjust every 1,000 gallons. The average household in Clinton City uses 4,500 gallons; Over 75 percent of households use less than 6,000 gallons. Higher users will have higher increases.

This means that in February; residents will see the following adjustments on their utility bills:

- Less than 2,000 gallons will have a \$0.50 reduction per month.
- Less than 4,000 gallons will have a \$1.08 increase per month.
- Less than 6,000 gallons will have a \$2.77 increase per month.

These funds will be used solely to support the water enterprise fund. Each year, the goal is to have the income from water rate fees balance with the expenses of system maintenance and the cost of the City's water allotment from Weber Basin. In addition, it is important to have reserve funds available to pay for unforeseen issues. For several years, we have had operating deficits.

Conservation is also an important factor for this change. Water is a finite resource and demand will continue to grow. It is likely that, in the future, we will see more water restrictions and higher pricing due to supplier costs and utility increases. We will continue to evaluate rates annually and make modifications where applicable.

Also reflected in the January bill arriving in February, will be the removal of the Davis County Animal Control fee of \$1.25.

The Utah Transit Authority is Planning for the Future Transit Service in Utah by developing a Five-Year Service Plan. Where and how we grow has impacts on the entire transportation network. This vision for the path ahead works to address these impacts through improvements to the transit system and reflects UTA's intended service based on the best information available.
