Name this tune and find all the lyrics! Without further ado, I bring to you, rental dwelling licenses. Now let's get down to business! Cities use this critical tool to ensure rental properties meet basic standards of safety, habitability, responsible management, and adherence to city codes. These licenses have been used by neighboring cities for decades. In December, the City Council passed an ordinance requiring all rental properties in Clinton to obtain a Rental Dwelling License starting January 1, 2025.

Why is this important? Because it ensures all properties meet minimum health and safety standards, fosters accountability for landlords, and helps maintain the character and security of our neighborhoods. Neighborhood stability is crucial. By regulating rental properties, the city can help prevent property neglect, reduce unsafe or overcrowded housing, maintain property values and foster a more consistent and predictable housing environment. By implementing these licenses, we send a powerful message: every home matters, every resident deserves respect, and we're all in this together.

The process is simple, if you own a rental unit in Clinton, you'll need to register it with the City and pay an annual administrative fee of \$152. This is the same amount as a commercial business license. This will allow us to keep better track of rental properties and ensure compliance with health and safety regulations. Having good contact information will help us communicate more efficiently with landlords, property managers and residents when necessary.

As your mayor, I'm grateful for your cooperation in making this a smooth transition. I know change can sometimes feel inconvenient, but small actions like these contribute to the big picture; a Clinton where every resident feels safe, valued, and proud of where they live. So, there you have it folks.

PROTECT YOUR FAMILY FROM CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING

This time of year, the Fire Department gets many calls on Carbon Monoxide alarms going off in a home. Each year in the United States, more than 150 people die from accidental non-fire-related carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning associated with consumer products. These products include faulty, improperly used, or incorrectly vented fuel-burning appliances such as furnaces, stoves, water heaters, and fireplaces. *Source: Consumer Product Safety Commission*

What is Carbon Monoxide (CO)?

CO, often called "the silent killer," is a gas you cannot see, taste, or smell. It can be created when fossil fuels, such as kerosene, gasoline, coal, natural gas, propane, methane or wood do not burn properly.

Know the Symptoms of CO Poisoning

Because CO is odorless, colorless, and otherwise undetectable to the human senses, people may not know they are being exposed. The first symptoms of low to moderate CO poisoning are like the flu (but without the fever). They include Headache, Fatigue, Shortness of breath, Nausea and Dizziness.

CO Poisoning can be mistaken for the Flu. High-level CO poisoning results in progressively more severe symptoms, including Mental confusion, Vomiting, Loss of muscular coordination, Loss of consciousness, and Ultimately death.

Safety Tips

- Have your home heating systems (including chimneys and vents) inspected and serviced annually by a trained technician.
- Never leave a car running in an attached garage, even with the garage door open.
- Never use portable generators inside homes or garages, even if doors and windows are open. Use generators outside only, far away from the home.
- Never bring a charcoal grill into the house for heating or cooking. Do not barbeque in the garage.
- Never use a gas range or oven for heating.
- Open the fireplace damper before lighting a fire and keep it open until the ashes are cool. An open damper may help prevent the build-up of poisonous gases inside the home.
- Battery-operated or battery backed up CO alarms should be installed on each level of your home and outside separate sleeping areas.
- Never ignore an alarming CO alarm. It is warning you of a potentially deadly hazard. If the alarm signal sounds do not try to find the source of the CO. Immediately move outside your residence to a predetermined meeting place. **Please leave your windows and doors closed.** It makes it a lot easier to find where the problem may be. **Call 911.**
- Replace CO alarms per the manufacturer's recommendations. The typical replacement time frame is 7 to 10 years.
